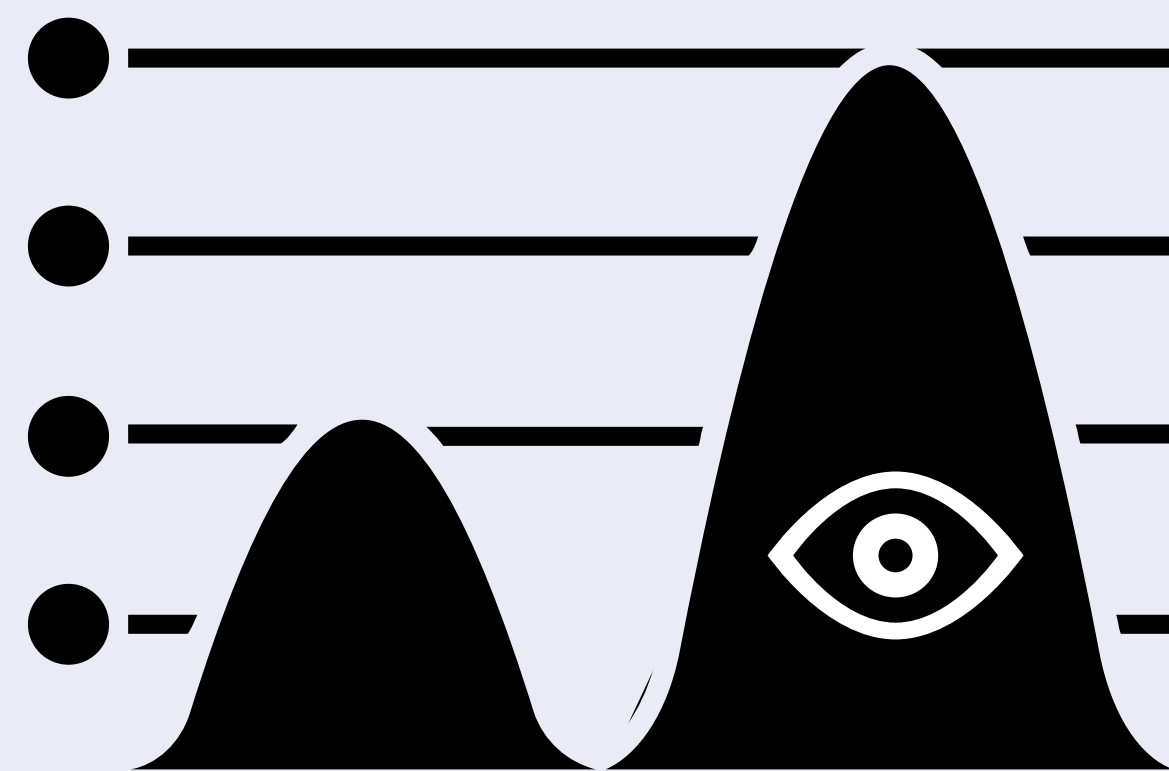


Factors influencing emergency department observation time following anaphylaxis: a systematic review

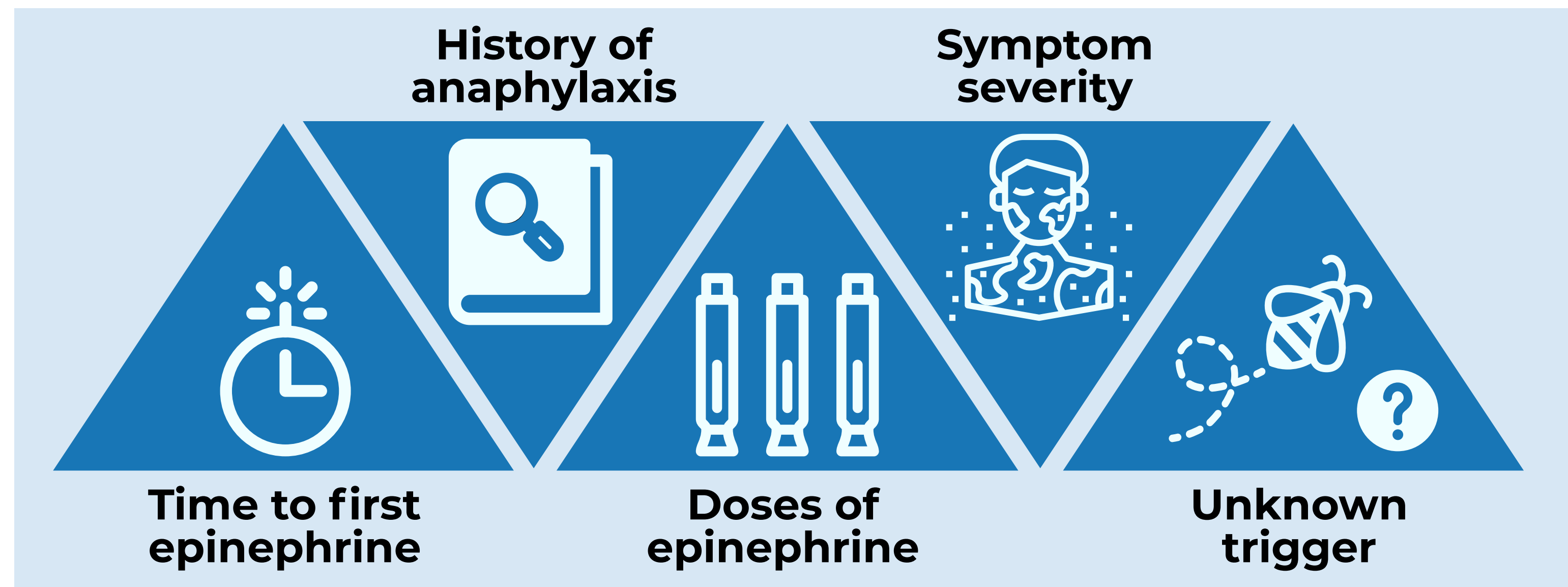
A minority of those with anaphylaxis experience a biphasic reaction

To address this challenge, predictors of a biphasic reaction that require extended observation periods are needed:



Therefore, periods of observation are recommended

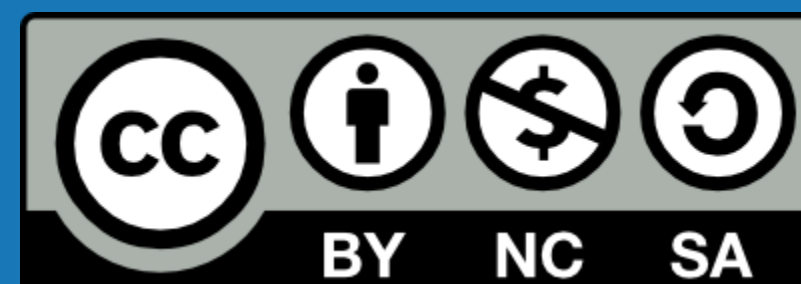
Risk factors most often associated with biphasic reactions:



Take Home Message: Observation time should be based on risk estimation, and no single factor can predict a biphasic reaction
